MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

For Interstate Voter Registration Data Comparison

January, 2013

This Memorandum of Understanding is made between the chief state election officials respectively of the States of Alaska, Arizona, Arkansas, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Michigan, Mississippi, Missouri, Nebraska, Ohio, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee and Virginia.

WHEREAS, the States through the offices of the chief state election official and under the authority of the respective state laws have each separately implemented a variety of changes to election processes as required by Public Law 107-252, The Help America Vote Act of 2002, among these changes being the implementation of a centralized, interactive, computerized statewide voter registration list, and:

WHEREAS, the chief state election officials of the respective States desire to enter into this Memorandum of Understanding to set forth the terms of an agreement between the respective officers, on behalf of their respective States, to establish between them and between the States a process for each State to improve the accuracy of each State's voter registration list;

NOW, THEREFORE, the undersigned chief state election officials, in exchange for the mutual promises and commitments contained in this Memorandum of Understanding, do herby agree as follows:

- The States agree to share voter registration information for the purposes of cross checking and identifying duplicate registrations and instances of multiple votes by the same individuals.
- 2. The process of cross checking will be as follows:
 - a. Each State will send a file containing voter registration data to the Kansas Secretary of State's office in a format and on a schedule to be determined by mutual agreement, with the intention of conducting a cross check at minimum once per year.

- Each participating State's list will be compared to the lists from the other participating States.
- c. The Kansas Secretary of State will return the results of the data cross check to each participating State. The data will include the State possessing the matching record, any information about such voter provided said State, and the date the voter registered in said State.
- d. Potential duplicate records will be identified when the first names, last names and dates of birth match.
- e. All data will be transferred to and from the Kansas Secretary of State using industry standard encryption technology and passwords.
- f. All original data will be securely destroyed upon completion of the project.
- 3. The data will be provided in the format described in Attachment A of this MOU. If there is a change to the data format the state(s) will be properly notified of the change prior to the submission of any data.
- 4. The Kansas Secretary of State shall maintain procedures and controls acceptable to other participating states for the purpose of assuring that information in its possession is not mishandled, misused, released, disclosed, or used in an inappropriate manner by it, its agents, officers, or employees. All parties to this agreement shall take all reasonable steps and precautions to safeguard this information and shall not divulge the information to parties other than those needed for the performance of duties under the agreement. Information transferred under this agreement shall be used only for the purposes identified in the agreement.
- 5. Notwithstanding aggregate usage statistics used for reporting purposes, and subject to the Kansas Open Records Act, the Kansas Secretary of State shall keep confidential all information concerning individual registrants. The Kansas Secretary of State shall not, under any conditions, resell, transfer or convey information about registrants to any third party.
- Each chief state election official shall designate such staff from his or her respective
 office as may be deemed necessary to carry out the terms of the Memorandum of
 Understanding.
- 7. This Memorandum of Understanding may be joined by additional States by signature of the chief state election officer in each such State without prior approval of the original participating states.



Program Description

In 2006 an interstate data crosscheck was conducted for the first time in the midwest, based on a Memorandum of Understanding signed by the chief state election officials of the states of Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa, Missouri and Minnesota. In 2007 the crosscheck was repeated, with the addition of South Dakota. Over the years more states have joined the program; in 2012 there were 15 states with nearly 48 million records involved, and in 2013 there were 22 states with nearly 85 million records. See the map at the end of this document.

The crosscheck is part of the comprehensive Kansas voter registration list maintenance program. It is similar in some respects to the NCOA program, which each county is required to participate in or, as an alternative, to conduct its own countywide mailings to identify possible changes of address. Both programs result in the mailing of confirmation notices and the addition of records to the inactive file.

Program Design

The program compares voter registration data using the following fields:

- first name
- middle name or initial
- last name
- date of birth
- last four digits of Social Security number (if available)

NOTE: If a voter's record is included on the list provided to the CEO, it means the records *matched exactly* on first name, last name and date of birth. For the middle name or initial, if the records are included it means they were either a match or not a non-match (ex: James in one record, J. in another would not be excluded). Social Security numbers are included for verification; the numbers might or might not match.

Strength of Match Criteria

A field called "Match" is included for each pair of matching records. The number in this field indicates the strength of the match—the higher the number, the stronger the match. Numbers range from 10 to 95; in some cases the field is blank. We ask that you process all the apparent matches listed in your results file, but you should start with the strongest matches.

Fields Included

The list provided to the CEO shows the Kansas registrant's information (as listed above) plus the following:

- Kansas registrant ID#
- Kansas date of registration

- Kansas county name
- state, county, registrant ID# and date of registration in state where duplicate was found
- - status (active/inactive)
 - voter history (2012)
- address, city, state, zip.

Data Format

The information is provided in a csv file on SOSIX. Each CEO must sign on to SOSIX to retrieve the county's file at forums/ELVIS/2013crossstateduplicatecheckresults.

Processing the Information

The registration dates are extremely important. If the CEO receives notice through this program that a registrant in the CEO's county has a newer registration date in another jurisdiction, the CEO must mail a forwardable confirmation notice to the registrant according to K.S.A. 25-2316c(e).

CEO Actions

If it appears that a registrant in the CEO's county has moved to another county or state and reregistered, the CEO must use the following procedure:

- 1. Determine that the registrant's registration date in the other jurisdiction is more recent than the date on the CEO's record. If it is more recent, go on to Step 2.
- 2. Mail a forwardable confirmation notice to the registrant at the new address. Change the registrant's status in ELVIS to "inactive."
- 3. If the registrant returns the confirmation notice verifying that the registrant has moved out of the CEO's county, cancel the registration.
- 4. If the registrant returns the confirmation notice indicating that the registrant has <u>not</u> moved to another jurisdiction and wishes to maintain his/her registration in the CEO's county, change the registrant's status in ELVIS back to "active."
- 5. If the registrant does not return the confirmation notice, or if the Postal Service returns the confirmation notice as undeliverable, do nothing else. The voter's status in ELVIS remains "inactive." If the voter fails to vote in any election from the date of the confirmation notice through the second succeeding November general election, cancel the registration.

Please note the following:

1. Inactive records---

If the registrant who appears to have moved to another jurisdiction is already "inactive" in ELVIS, there is no need to mail another confirmation notice. The CEO must cancel the inactive registrant's registration if the person fails to vote in any election from the date of the original confirmation notice through the second succeeding November general election.

2. Previous addresses—

If the CEO obtains a copy of a registrant's registration record from another jurisdiction and the registrant listed an address that was on file in the CEO's county as "Previous Address" on the other jurisdiction's voter registration application form, the CEO may cancel the registration. Also, if the CEO receives a notice from a registrar in another jurisdiction indicating that a registrant has re-registered in that registrar's jurisdiction and has indicated a previous address that was on file in the CEO's county, the CEO may cancel the registration without reviewing the actual voter registration application submitted by the registrant.

3. Local knowledge—

In some cases the CEO may choose not to act on information from this program if the CEO has information that is more current. Example: If the CEO knows the voter moved away, reregistered, then moved back to CEO's jurisdiction and re-re-registered after the registration date listed on the information from the other jurisdiction.


4. The CEO may always act on information provided directly by the voter.

Voter History and Double Votes

The principal purpose of the data cross checking program is to identify duplicate and out of state registrations, but it also provides an opportunity to identify double votes. Most of the states participating in the crosscheck program provide voter history for each voter for the most recent November general election.

If two records representing the same individual contain voter history in the same election, research must be conducted to verify a double vote. Records must be exchanged between jurisdictions to verify that the records do in fact represent the same individual, signatures must be compared, and poll book/advance voting records must be consulted to verify that a double vote took place.

The records must then be presented to county, state or federal prosecutors for investigation and possible prosecution. The Secretary of State's office often conducts this research and can help coordinate research with CEOs.

I. Joining the Crosscheck Program

- 1. Chief State Election Official (CSEO) or designee signs the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU)
- 2. CSEO assigns two staff members:
 - a. one election administration person
 - b. one IT/database person
- 3. Staff members will:
 - a. participate in annual conference calls and emails
 - b. pull voter registration data in January and upload to FTP site
 - c. receive crosscheck results and process them
 - d. instruct local election officials
 - (1) mail notices to registrants
 - (2) promptly respond to requests for signatures, addresses, etc.
- 4. There is no cost. Processing the duplicate registrations and researching possible double votes requires a commitment of time at the state and local levels. States make individual decisions about the amount of time and effort they will commit, and this might vary from year to year. A state that is not able to commit the resources to process the results in a given year still provides a benefit to the other states through its participation.

II. Data Comparison Procedure

- 1. Designate at least one administrative and one IT/database contact person to be on the email list serve.
- 2. At least one person from each state should participate in a conference call hosted by Kansas in November or December preceding the crosscheck.
- 3. Pull your entire database on January 15, 2014 and upload it to the secure FTP site hosted by Arkansas. Instructions and, if necessary, followup reminders and questions, will come from the Kansas or Arkansas IT/database persons. Each state's data should include Active and Inactive records if possible. Follow the prescribed data format. Review and edit your data before uploading it. Do not truncate fields, reverse fields, or leave them blank. Please include SSN4.
- 4. Kansas will download files, delete everything from FTP site, run the data comparison, and upload individual state results files to the FTP site. At every stage of the process, data files are encrypted and zipped.
- 5. When notified by Kansas, download your results files from the Arkansas FTP site. After downloading, make sure all data are deleted from the FTP site.
- 6. Process the results according to your state's laws, regulations and policies.
- 7. Respond promptly to inquiries from other states or local jurisdictions for information to confirm duplicates or to obtain evidence of double votes. Usually this will be copies of signatures on poll books or absentee/advance ballot applications and return envelopes.

III. Analyzing Results

Each state analyzes and acts upon the results according to its own laws and regulations. No state is required by the Memorandum of Understanding to act upon the results.

A. Cancellations and Confirmation Mailings

An apparent duplicate registration is produced when the first names, last names and dates of birth in two records match exactly. Other information such as middle name, suffix and SSN4 should be used to confirm whether the two records are matches. It may be necessary to contact another jurisdiction to obtain more information, such as signatures.

An apparent duplicate registration may result in one of two actions being taken:

- 1. The jurisdiction possessing the record with the older registration date may cancel the record (and send a cancellation notice if state laws or regulations require it) if the following conditions are met:
 - a. The records match on first name, last name, and date of birth, and
 - b. One or both of the following data elements match:
 - last four digits of Social Security number and
 - signature and
 - c. Data in the middle name field either matches or is not a mismatch.
- 2. The jurisdiction possessing the record with the older registration date may mail a confirmation notice, pursuant to the National Voter Registration Act of 1993, Sec. 8(d)(2), if the three fields match as specified in item 1.a. above. These registrants' names are added to the state's Inactive list pending cancellation after two federal general elections, assuming there has been no voting activity during that period.

B. Cancellations by Confirmation Between Jurisdictions

Pursuant to NVRA Sec. 8(d)(1)(A), the jurisdiction possessing the record with the older registration data may cancel the record (and send a cancellation notice if state laws or regulations require it) if another jurisdiction confirms that the registrant has registered to vote in the newer jurisdiction and has indicated on the voter registration application form an address in the former jurisdiction.

C. Information Sharing

Each state will decide whether it prefers that followup requests for information from other states and localities should be addressed to the state or the individual

localities. All participating states will be notified of this preference. Each state will provide contact information for local election offices. States and localities are cautioned against sending registrants' personally identifiable information via email.

D. Double Votes

- 1. When two records are determined to be duplicates, review the voter history field to determine if there appears to be a double vote. Experience in the crosscheck program indicates that a significant number of apparent double votes are false positives and not double votes. Many are the result of errors—voters sign the wrong line in the poll book, election clerks scan the wrong line with a barcode scanner, or there is confusion over father/son voters (Sr. and Jr.).
- 2. Collect copies of signatures from the election officers in the two jurisdictions in which the double votes occurred. The classic double vote occurs when a person votes in person at the polling place on election day in the jurisdiction where he/she normally lives and also casts an absentee (advance) ballot by mail in the other jurisdiction.

In these cases, evidence to prove the double vote occurred often includes the following:

- Signature from the voter's application for voter registration in jurisdiction A
- Signature from the voter's application for voter registration in jurisdiction B
- Signature from the poll book in jurisdiction A
- Signature on an absentee (advance) ballot application form in jurisdiction B
- Signature on the absentee (advance) ballot return envelope in jurisdiction B
- 3. The collection of evidence to prove double votes is a considerable commitment of time and effort. It requires a high level of cooperation and communication between jurisdictions.
- 4. Compare the signatures. Once you are satisfied that the evidence indicates a double vote occurred, refer the case to a local or state prosecutor. Include a referral cover letter, cite relevant state statutes, and include copies of all necessary documents.

E. Information Request Form

A request form as appears below may be used to request followup information from other jurisdictions. Jurisdictions may adapt it as needed and produce it on their own letterhead.

Maintenance)

We will first discuss the statutorily-mandated list maintenance activities that counties must complete once per year.

We will then move on to a discussion regarding Duplicate Voter Records in SURE and our initial experience with addressing these duplicate records.

And for the finale, we will discuss what everyone wants to learn about: The Interstate Crosscheck Program.

Slide 3:

Each county must complete at least two list maintenance programs each year.

The NCOA is provided for by the Department of State.

As an alternative to the NCOA, a county may complete a mass confirmation mailing. The confirmation mailing must be sent to all registered voters in the county.

A county may conduct a Canvass <u>in conjunction with</u> either the NCOA or the Confirmation Mailing. The Canvass cannot be substituted for either the NCOA or the Confirmation Mailing.

Every county MUST complete the 'Five-Year' Mailing.

These list maintenance mailings cannot be conducted within 90 days of the November election (per State Law). In Federal elections, these list maintenance mailings cannot be conducted within 90 days of either the Primary or the November election.

Slide 4:

As you know, the Department of State currently provides for you a process by which duplicate records are identified in SURE. These duplicate records are periodically provided to you in a spreadsheet. The county(s) with the oldest record(s) are sent a list of voter records that provides the names and addresses of those individuals to whom a Duplicate Voter Notice should be sent.

This program was established to address the questions surrounding the thousands of potential duplicate records residing in the SURE system. This effort, like other

list maintenance efforts, is an important part of maintaining faith among voters in the election process.

Based on our initial experience with the Duplicate Voter Notice program, the Department has decided to make some changes to the notice itself and to how the program is conducted.

First, the notice itself has been altered to ensure that a voter who receives the notice understands what she is being asked to confirm.

Second, the Department has determined that it is unnecessary to provide you with a duplicate list that contains voters who are in inactive status. Because this group of voters are inactive, we can safely assume they have already received a list maintenance mailing.

This program, while it may continue to evolve, provides an effective method for removing duplicate records from the voter rolls. It does not, however, address records that may be duplicates of active voter records in other jurisdictions. To meet this need, the Interstate Crosscheck Program was established in 2005. The original four members of the program are lowa, Kansas, Nebraska and Missouri. In 2012, the number of states participating grew to 15 and in the upcoming year 28 states will be participating, including Pennsylvania.

Kansas manages the crosscheck program and Arkansas provides technical support.

Each participating state must sign a Memorandum of Understanding, which sets the ground rules for participation and ensures, among other things, that personal voter information is kept securely within the confines of this program.

The file will be provided to the program administrators via a secure site on January 15, 2014. Several weeks later the Department will receive a file of potential duplicate records.

The file we provide to the program administrators will not contain inactive records.

The Department is currently working through some of the technical and logistical considerations, including this program's interaction with the NCOA and other list maintenance activities. (WE DO NOT WANT TO DUPLICATE WORK.)

To be considered an apparent duplicate record, the first names, last names and dates of birth in two records must match exactly.

Other information provided in the file is included in the list of apparent matches, including middle name, name suffix and the last four of the SSN.

All but a handful of the participating states provide SSN4 information with their notice.

Strength of match is determined largely by the number of fields that match, but discrepancies between the two records enable an election official to identify a potential "similar" voter record.

The Department has drafted a Duplicate Voter Notice that is very similar to the 'PA Duplicate Voter Notice'. This notice can be used by a county as a tool for verifying that a voter has indeed moved out of Pennsylvania and is may no longer be qualified to vote here.





Voting rolls cleanup

Pennsylvania's move to join a multistate alliance focused on cleaning up voter-registration rolls is a positive step, but it's likely to induce fits of anger and shouts of "Disenfranchisement!" from those leftists who believe that people should vote, and often, in every election.

The coalition of almost half of all states cross-checks voters' names to catch people who register in more than one state and dead people who aren't removed from voter rolls. Officials this year reportedly have identified 5 million questionable registrations in 22 states.

Ensuring the accuracy of voter rolls, proponents say, does not trample access to voting except for those who, whether out of ignorance or intent, abuse the system. Nevertheless, the same people who demonize voter IDs, as they have in Pennsylvania, also demean efforts to clean up voter rolls.

Never mind Pennsylvania's own mandate that counties check yearly for voters who have changed addresses or died, says Jim Montini, Westmoreland County's director of elections.

In Virginia, only weeks before its gubernatorial election, that state's Democratic Party has filed a lawsuit seeking an injunction to prevent the Board of Elections from purging up to 57,000 names from the state rolls, The Washington Times reports. Even removing illegitimate voters is unacceptable to those who hold open the door to double-dealers.

That's because the integrity of voting rolls is meaningless for those who put winning, any way they can, above everything else.

Election integrity: A mobile nation must purge duplicate voters

Legitimate voters have been targets of clever campaigns to keep them from the polls. Identification laws, harsh sentences for violating them and the curtailment of early voting have all been used in states to discourage certain subsets of voters from exercising their rights.

In many cases the rules have been enacted by Republicans and opposed by Democrats who fear their members will face added hurdles to voting. But a national move to bring more integrity to the voter rolls is getting support from both parties across the country.

In August Pennsylvania joined 23 states in an effort to identify voters who are registered in more than one state. Election officials say the initiative is needed because registration systems cannot keep up with a society of voters who move from state to state.

The Pew Center on the States reported last year that 24 million voter registrations nationwide are no longer valid or are significantly inaccurate, more than 1.8 million deceased people are on the voter rolls and 2.75 million people are registered to vote in more than one state.

The alliance of states uses names, birth dates and Social Security numbers of registered voters to weed out duplicates. If an apparent duplicate is found, the voter is contacted. If a voter can't be reached, the name stays on the rolls for two more federal elections.

It's one thing to erect barriers to voting, but the voter rolls must have integrity. In America, registration should be simple and voting should be encouraged. But once an election is enough.

States joining forces to scrub voter rolls

SEATTLE -

More than half of states are now working in broad alliances to scrub voter rolls of millions of questionable registrations, identifying people registered in multiple states and tens of thousands of dead voters who linger on election lists.

Poll managers are looking for more states to get involved and say the efforts are necessary because outdated voter registration systems are unable to keep up with a society where people frequently move from one state to another. While many of the registration problems are innocent, some election leaders fear the current disorder within the system is inviting trouble.

"It creates an environment where there could be more problems," said Scott Gessler, the Republican secretary of state in Colorado. "It's a precursor to potential fraud, there's no doubt about it."

Half of all states have now joined a consortium anchored by the state of Kansas, compiling their voter registration lists at the end of every year to assess for duplicates. That program has grown rapidly since beginning in 2005 in an agreement between four Midwestern states.

Meanwhile, seven states are coordinating on another project that makes those assessments more frequently with advanced algorithms — while also checking for deceased voters.

The efforts are already finding massive numbers of outdated or problematic registrations. This year, the Kansas project identified some 5 million records that were questionable in 22 states and also identified some people who voted in multiple states, according to officials. The newer project — known as the Electronic Registration Information Center — identified hundreds of thousands of other registrations that need updating, including 23,000 people who were dead.

The larger system identified more than a dozen people who voted in Kansas and another state, said Kansas Republican Secretary of State Kris Kobach, and those identifications could lead to prosecution. He said the expansion of the checks and awareness of the program will hopefully deter others from double-voting.

Both data-matching programs are bipartisan. That is different than just before the 2012 election, when Republicans predominantly led efforts they portrayed as issues of election integrity, including the purge of possible noncitizens from rolls and the passage of voter ID laws. Democrats and voter advocacy groups had raised concerns about those efforts, questioning whether they would prevent legitimate voters from casting a ballot.

"The states that are on board are all very much working as a partnership," said Scott Gilles, Nevada's deputy secretary of elections under Democratic Secretary of State Ross Miller. Nevada has been one of the early participants in the ERIC program and also recently joined the Kansas project.

Citizenship checks are not part of the current programs. Participants in ERIC discussed doing citizenship analysis as part of its system but agreed not to include it because the data is often outdated and unreliable, said Shane Hamlin, the deputy director of election in Washington state. He said that information may be included some day in the future but not any time soon.

Wendy Weiser, who monitors voting rights issues at the Brennan Center for Justice at New York University's School of Law, cautioned that election leaders also need to be careful to ensure that eligible voters are not getting removed.

For one, she said there can be high error rates since different people share names and birthdates. Kobach estimated that the Kansas program produced an error rate of maybe a few percent, which would be many thousands of voters.

Weiser added that states need to be careful about what they do with potential duplicates. She said voters should be notified and provided time to correct errors. If there's no response, the voter should be placed on inactive status for two federal elections, Weiser said.

Some of the leaders in the matching programs said those are the standard procedures.

Under the Kansas program, officials produce reports identifying people who appear to be duplicate registrants. States and counties then work to verify the information and remove the voters.

Under the ERIC program, states submit their voter registration lists and driver's license information to a data center in Wisconsin. The program also uses the Social Security Death Index and national change-of-address records. An employee of the ERIC program — funded by fees paid by the member states — runs reports from all that data that states can use.

In addition to deceased people, ERIC reports from this summer identified 93,000 people who are registered in one state but appear to now live — and are possibly registered — elsewhere, and 14,000 people who appear to be registered multiple times in one state.

Washington state officials said they had already being examining the national death index for people to remove. But they said the ERIC system has more powerful identification algorithms.

The ERIC program participants also see other potential. By expanding the available data, states are able to identify large portions of the population that appear to be eligible to vote but are not registered. The states have been sending information to those potential voters with registration details.

Washington state Secretary of State Kim Wyman, a Republican, said that fits with the duties of election leaders to make sure every eligible voter has the opportunity to participate.

"We really do have a commitment to access and a commitment to accuracy," Wyman said,

Pennsylvania Takes Historic Step, Joins Other States to Identify Potential Duplicate Voter Registrations

Philadelphia – Secretary of the Commonwealth Carol Aichele today announced Pennsylvania is taking an historic step toward protecting the integrity of every vote, by joining a multi-state consortium to identify voters who may be registered to vote in more than one state.

"Protecting the integrity of every vote by making sure only those individuals legally entitled to cast ballots determine the outcome of our elections is a priority of Governor Corbett and of mine," Aichele said at the 2013 County Election Officials Conference meeting in Philadelphia.

"One concern about the integrity of voter lists has always been whether someone who moves to another state could be registered and possibly cast votes in both states, which is against the law. Participating in this consortium is our best way to prevent that," said Aichele, whose department oversees elections in Pennsylvania.

Several years ago, a handful of Midwestern states created a plan to cross-check voter registration databases. This program, called the Interstate Voter Registration Crosscheck Program, has grown to include 23 states. Kansas operates the crosscheck program at no cost to participating states.

In 2012, Aichele said, the Interstate Voter Registration Crosscheck Program discovered more than five million potential duplicate registrations.

"We are a mobile society in the United States, and it is important that election officials use available tools to make sure only legally registered individuals vote, and only cast one ballot on election day," Aichele sald.

"I believe this program can help us remove from Pennsylvania's voter rolls people who have moved to other states and registered to vote there. This will improve the integrity of our voter lists, protect the legally cast ballots by our citizens and further bolster public confidence in our electoral process," Alchele said.

Pennsylvania will provide data for the crosscheck program in January 2014 and should have a list of potential duplicate registrations early next year.

"We will then ask county election officials to use the same process for contacting voters to verify their address and, if appropriate, remove them from the Pennsylvania voter rolls, as is now used when someone moves to another county within Pennsylvania," Aichele said. "By using the same process that is now in place I hope to keep the workload for our county officials to a minimum."

When voters move from one county to another within Pennsylvania, and register to vote at their new residence, the potential duplicate registration shows up in Pennsylvania's Statewide Uniform Registry of Electors (SURE) system. The Department of State then notifies the county election office having the older address for this voter to contact that voter and verify the correct address. If the new address is verified, the voter is removed from the rolls by his or her former county election office, thus preventing someone from voting twice.

Prior to the Interstate Voter Registration Crosscheck Program, there was no similar method to identify potential duplicate registrations among states.

In addition to Pennsylvania, other states in the Interstate Voter Registration Crosscheck Program include: Alaska, Arizona, Arkansas, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Michigan, Mississippi, Missouri, Nebraska, Ohio, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee and Virginia.
